SEC. 305. MEASUREMENT OF HIGHWAYS

(a) A representative of the agency in the presence of the selectmen or their designee shall measure and inspect the class 1,2 and 3 town highways in each town at least once every ten years. The agency shall notify the town when any highway, or portion of a highway, does not meet the standards for its assigned class. If the town fails, within one year, to restore the highway or portion of the highway to the accepted standard, or to reclassify, or to discontinue, or develop an acceptable schedule for restoring to the accepted standards, the agency for purposes of apportionment under section 306 of this title shall deduct the affected mileage from that assigned to the town for the particular

(b) Annually, on or before February 10, the selectmen shall, after review by a representative of the agency, file with the town clerk a sworn statement of the description and measurements of all class 1, 2 and 3 town highways, then in existence, including any special designation such as a throughway or scenic highway. When class 1, 2 or 3 town highways are accepted, discontinued, or reclassified, a copy of the proceedings shall be filed in the town clerk's affice and a copy shall be forwarded to the agency.

(c) The agency shall not accept any change in mileage until the records required to be filed in the town clerk's office by this section are received by the agency.

(d) The selectmen of any town who are aggrieved by a finding of the agency concerning the measurement, description or classification of a town highway may appeal to the board by filing a notice of appeal with the executive secretary of the board.

Title 19, V. S. A. Section 2502 Added 1985

Soc. 2502. TOWN SCENIC ROADS; DESIGNATION AND DISCONTINUANCE

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(a) On recommendation of the planning commission of a municipality, or on the initiative of the legislative body of a municipality, a legislative body may, after one public hearing warned for the purpose, designate or discontinue any town highway or portion of a town highway, as a town scenic highway. Such action by the legislative body may be petitioned by the registered voters of the municipality pursuant to the provisions of section 1973 of Title 24.

(b) A town scenic road may be reconstructed or improved in a manner consistent with the standards established by the transportation board, pursuant to section 425 of Title 10. A class 1, 2 or 3 scenic highway shall still be eligible to receive aid pursuant to the provisions of this title.

(c) The legislative body of a municipality may appeal for a variance from standards promulgated by the transportation board. In these appeals the board's decision shall be final.

In accordance with said notice, a copy of which is attached hereto, the Board of Selectmen met at the Stratton Town Hall on Monday, August 10, 1987 at 7:00 p.m. to consider the following:

1. The discontinuance of Town Highway No. 22 which runs easterly from Penny Avenue (Town Highway No. 20) a distance of 0.05 miles.

2. The discontinuance of Town Highway No. 19 which runs southeasterly from Pike Hollow Road (Town Highway No. 18) a distance of 0.10 miles.

3. The discontinuance of Town Highway No. 21 (the northern end of Handle Road) which runs southwesterly from Vermont Route 100 to the Dover Town Line a distance of 0.38 miles.

Present at the hearing were Selectmen Lauren, Bills, Dupell, LaMarche, and Tuttle; Town Clerk Andy King; Town Attorney Robert Pu; Mr. Michael Babbits, Mrs. Janet Greene and Donna Friedman of the U.S. Forest Service.

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Testimony was taken from Attorney Pu, Town Clerk King, Mr. Babbits, Mrs. Janet Greene and Donna Friedman. All parties present waived their right to require the Board to examine the premises affected by the possible discontinuance of the abovedescribed highways.

In consideration of the testimony and official town records, the Board makes the following findings of fact, conclusions of law, and order:

Findings of Fact

1. Town Highway No. 22 only serves the property owned by Mr. Michael Babbits and Mr. Babbits has no objection to the road being abandoned so long as the Town continues to plow the road to its junction with his driveway.

2. Town Highway No. 19 only serves the property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Richard Steiner and Mr. and Mrs. Steiner have no objection to the road being abandoned so long as the Town agrees to put in a new culvert at the end of the road.

3. Mrs. Janet Greene spoke in support of the proposed discontinuance of Town Highway No. 21. A representative from the United States Forest Service was also present and offered some testimony. However, due to some concern about the U.S. Forest Service's right of way, the Board was reluctant to make a decision on this road without first contacting Mr. Edward Griffith of the U.S. Forest Service in Rutland.

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4. Subsequent to the hearing, both the Chairman and the Town Clerk spoke with Mr. Edward Griffith of the U.S. Forest Service. The Forest Service is not opposed to the discontinuance of Town Highway No. 19. However, they would like to maintain access to their property, either by having the road discontinued but with the right of way maintained or by acquiring a separate right of way from the Town of Stratton.

Conclusions of Law

4. The Board of Selectmen has the authority to lay out, alter and discontinue highways, subject to the public good, necessity or convenience.

5. When a highway is discontinued, the right of way may be continued at the same width by the Board of Selectmen by designating the right of way as a trail.

6. If a discontinued highway is not designated as a trail, it shall be set and belong to the owners of the adjoining lands; if it is located between lands of two different owners, it shall be set to the lots to which it originally belonged, if they can be ascertained; if not, it shall be equally divided between the owners of the land on each side.

7. Since Town Highways Nos. 22 and 19 only serve one property owner each, the public good, necessity and convenience of the inhabitants of the Town of Stratton are best served by the discontinuance of these two roads.

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8. All of the property owners potentially affected by the possible discontinuance of Town Highway No. 21, with the exception of the United States Forest Service, have access to their property from Route 100.

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9. Provided that the Town of Stratton gives the United States Forest Service a right of way to their property, the public good, necessity and convenience of the inhabitants of the Town of Stratton are best served by the discontinuance of Town Highway No. 21.

<u>Order</u>

WHEREFORE, Town Highway No. 22 which runs easterly from Penny Avenue (Town Highway No. 20) a distance of 0.05 miles; Town Highway No. 19 which runs southeasterly from Pike Hollow Road (Town Highway No. 18) a distance of 0.10 miles; and Town Highway No. 21 (the northern end of Handle Road) which runs southwesterly from Vermont Route 100 to the Dover Town Line a distance of 0.38 miles are hereby discontinued and the existing highway is hereby set to the owners of the adjoining lands. It is further ordered that upon receipt of a survey of the proposed right of way that the United States Forest Service would like to acquire from the Town of Stratton to replace the access formerly provided by Town Highway No. 21, the Town of Stratton shall execute and deliver an easement deed of said right of way to the United States Forest Service.

We, the Selectmen of the Town of Stratton, hereby report on our doings concerning the discontinuance of Town Highways Nos. 6 and 5 located within the Town of Stratton. Pursuant to resolution adopted at a regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen on the 22nd day of June, 1987, notices of the proposed discontinuance of Town Highways Nos. 6 & 5 were caused to be posted in the office of the Town Clerk, published in the Brattleboro Reformer on August 10, 1987, and mailed to the Stratton Planning Commission. Copies were also mailed to the following persons at the following addresses by Certified Mail, Return Receipt Requested:

In accordance with said notice, a copy of which is attached hereto, the Board of Selectmen met at the Stratton Town Hall on Monday, August 24, 1987 at 7:00 p.m. to consider the following:

1. The discontinuance of Town Highway No. 6 (Twing Farm Road) which runs easterly from its intersection with Town Highway Nos. 7 and 5 (abandoned section) to the Jamaica Town Line a distance of 0.16 miles. 2. The discontinuance of Town Highway No. 5 (abandoned section) which runs in a southerly direction from Town Highway No. 7 to the Jamaica Town Line a distance of 0.74 miles.

The Board of Selectmen together with Town Attorney Robert Pu and Jamaica Selectman Robert Brown drove to the site to examine the premises affected by the possible discontinuance of these two highways. The Board observed Town Highway No. 5 and the large boulder which had been placed at its entrance a number of years ago. The Board then drove to Town Highway No. 6 and proceeded to walk its full length. During the course of this walk, Mr. Brown expressed the desire of the Town of Jamaica that a turnaround be provided in the event that the road was discontinued. The site visit having concluded, the parties returned to the Stratton Town Hall to resume the hearing.

Present at the hearing were Selectmen Lauren, Bills, Dupell, LaMarche, and Tuttle; Town Clerk Andy King; Town Attorney Robert Pu; and Mr. Robert Brown, Selectman of the Town of Jamaica.

Mr. Brown was invited to testify and he repeated the sentiments that he had expressed earlier at the site. Members of the Board questioned why the Town of Stratton should provide a turnaround if they elected to discontinue the road. Mr. Brown was of the opinion that if the Town of Stratton discontinued its portion of the road that it would only be a matter of time before the Town of Jamaica did likewise. Town Attorney Robert Pu responded to questions from the Board members who wanted to know if Stratton was under any legal obligation to provide the turnaround. Mr. Pu indicated that he did not think that Stratton

was legally obligated to provide the turnaround if it discontinued the road. However, Mr. Pu did acknowledge that Jamaica's concerns were valid and suggested that if the road were discontinued it might be advisable to continue the right of way by designating it as a trail.

In consideration of the testimony, discussion, site visit, and offical town records, the Board makes the following findings of fact, conclusions of law, and order:

Findings of Fact

1. A 0.74-mile section of Town Highway No. 5 is presently a Class 4 highway and is not maintained at all by the Town of Stratton. A large boulder was placed at the entrance to the section of this road a number of years ago and it does not appear as if vehicles have used this section of road for a number of years.

2. S. Giles Payne, Equire, attorney for Lee J. Smith and William J. Buckley, owners of property adjacent to Town Highway^{**} No. 5, contacted Town Clerk Andy King and indicated that his clients had no objection to the discontinuance of this section of Town Highway No. 5.

3. The Town of Jamaica has no objection to the discontinu-

4. Town Highway No. 6 is presently a Class 3 highway and is passable to trucks and 4-wheel drive vehicles; however, it has not been maintained by the Town of Stratton.

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5. The Town of Jamaica is not opposed to the discontinuance of Town Highway No. 6; however, it would like to see the Town of Stratton provide a turnaround for vehicles forced to turn around at the point where the road is blocked off.

Conclusions of Law

6. The Board of Selectmen has the authority to lay out, alter and discontinue highways, subject to the public good; necessity or convenience.

7. When a highway is discontinued, the right of way may be continued at the same width by the Board of Selectmen by designating the right of way as a trail.

8. If a discontinued highway is not designated as a trail, it shall be set and belong to the owners of the adjoining lands; if it is located between lands of two different owners, it shall be set to the lots to which it originally belonged, if they can be ascertained; if not, it shall be equally divided between the owners of the land on each side.

9. Since Town Highway No. 5 is already a Class 4 highway and has been blocked off with a large boulder for a number of years, the public good, necessity and convenience of the inhabitants of the Town of Stratton are best served by the discontinuance of this highway.

10. Since Town Highway No. 6 continues into the Town of Jamaica and that portion of the highway is still is use, the public good, necessity and convenience of the inhabitants of the Towns of Stratton and Jamaica are best served by the discontinu-

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ance of this road and the preservation of the right of way by] designating it as a trail.

WHEREFORE, Town Highway No. 5 (abandoned section) which runs in a southerly direction from Town Highway No. 7 to the Jamaica Town Line a distance of 0.74 miles is hereby discontinued and the existing highway is hereby set to the owners of the adjoining land and Town Highway No. 6 (Twing Farm Road) which runs easterly from its intersection with Town Highways Nos. 7 and 5 (abandoned section) to the Jamaica Town Line a distance of 0.16 miles is hereby discontinued and the existing right of way designated as a trail.


